

Common Loon — Leg Band Color Chart





Leg bands enable researchers to identify individual loons from a distance in the field.

Plastic color bands are used in unique combinations (left leg) and metal bands are engraved with a unique I.D. number (right leg).

Have You Seen a Banded Loon in the Greater Yellowstone Ecosystem?

BRI researchers have marked Common Loons across western North America with colored leg bands. Color-marking and resighting of loons allows us to monitor breeding individuals, calculate annual return rates to territories, track local movements and migratory routes, and determine overwintering areas.

Marking and resighting efforts are essential tools for loon conservation.

If you have encountered a color-banded loon—either found a dead one, or seen a live one—then you can contribute to the loon conservation effort by reporting your observation to us.
